As co-chairs of the Board of Directors, we are pleased to share Chapter 510's 2021-22 Impact Report with you. This past year has been momentous for the organization: we opened a stunning new writing center in downtown Oakland. Our center is providing a post-shutdown space for youth to reconnect, create, and write with confidence and joy.

The new center comes after parents, teachers, youth, and adults—all of us who love storytelling—dreamed up the idea of an interactive, bright, inspiring place for Oakland youth. Architects at Gensler Oakland worked with us pro bono to create an inspired design. Talented artists, fabricators, builders, (and pneumatic tube vendors) brought color, life, plants, interactivity, and beauty to this new space. The words of youth poets adorn our windows and walls. Our young novelists' books are here, for sale, on our bookshelves.

We're thrilled, too, that we have a new podcasting studio. A cohort of teen storytellers came weekly to interview local legends, collect oral histories, and reimagine what more is possible at this historic location in Swan's Market in Old Oakland.

Hundreds of other young people are joining us at the beginning of something powerful. We hope this season you will find a way to get involved, too, and make the space for more youth creativity.

THE GRAND OPENINGS OF OUR WRITING CENTER, BOOKMAKING STUDIO, SOUND SPACE & STOREFRONT!

On April 29, after years of designing and nine months of building and beautifying, we celebrated the birth of our writing center in the heart of Old Town Oakland at Swan's Market. Our space was designed by Gensler Oakland, built by Redboot Construction and Girls Garage, and painted floor to ceiling by muralist Simon Tran.

At our opening, the center was blessed by our students, families, and community.

We wrote poetry, printed and made books in our Bookmaking Studio, recorded in our Sound Space recording studio, sent words flying through our pneumatic tube, and saw poets of all ages come through our magic doors to take to the stage for our first poetry reading. We cannot wait for what is to come. All the books that will be written, made, recorded, published . . . infinite possibilities abound.






CHAPTER 510 ALUMN LEILA MOTTLEY IS A *new york times* bestseller!

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: ERIC YANET-CANCHOLA, 5TH GRADE, HOOVER ELEMENTARY

Eric took part in our in-school program at Hoover Elementary in West Oakland from 3rd to 5th grade. He and his Hoover classmates wrote three books with Chapter 510: Motherland, Redefining Justice, and I Have Wings / Yo Tengo Alas, the last of which students wrote



after being inspired by learning about the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR).



For the ninth year, Chapter 510 volunteers mentored MetWest High School seniors on their college essays. This year, 40 students successfully completed their applications.






How do we reflect past, present, and future stories into the built environment? How might this process enable placemaking, placekeeping and belonging?

Holding these ambitious inquiries closely, a group of curious high school students gathered in January of 2022 at Chapter 510 in Oakland, California. Thus began a nine-month exploration of Swan's Market in partnership with Emily Weinstein Consulting, Sitelab Urban Studio, and an advisory board of historians, architects, culture workers, and journalists.

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: AIDA NDIAYE, 6TH GRADE, CLAREMONT MIDDLE SCHOOL

At the age of 13, Aida has already been a published author three times. She wrote her first book Evil Burrito and the FBI with Chapter 510 at the age of 10 in our second annual Picture Book Writing Camp, and went on to write a full-length chapter book, The Imagination Book, the following year. As a middle school student, Aida has continued in our programs and her poem "Shattered Memories" was one of six beautiful broadsides released in May. This coming year will mark her fifth year writing with us. It has been an honor to watch her grow as a writer and a powerful young woman.

new for the world.




TEACHING ARTIST SPOTLIGHT: DUANE HORTON

Duane Horton, an Oakland-based Black queer fantasy and science fiction writer, joined Chapter 510 as a teaching artist in January. Duane, reflecting on his own adolescence, mentions that he didn't see himself—either as a Black man or as a queer person—fully reflected in literature, sci-fi, or in mass media. "I am creating for students the kind of courses I wish I could have taken when I was young. It would have made me feel more confident had I had Black and queer writers and role models. I spent countless years feeling that I was on a solo journey."

At Chapter 510, Duane launched a science fiction and fantasy program for sixth and seventh graders of color who identify

as LGBTQ. He calls the sessions "thrilling," especially when he sees students apply techniques such as personification and alternate points of view to express their creativity, vulnerabilities and strengths. Duane also leads Chapter 510's creative writing class at Westlake Middle School, a course students take for school credit. Duane has an MFA in creative writing from Mills College, a BA in English and a minor in women's studies from Allegheny College, and recently completed his own fantasy novel. Duane is the 2022-23 Judith Tannenbaum Teaching Artist Fellow, which invests in writers of color who bring creative writing to community settings.



Where We're Headed In 2022–2023

Now that our center is open and we are back to in-person learning, we are excited to start a new chapter. In the coming year we plan to:

- Expand programming at our center, hosting
 1-2 FREE writing workshops each weekday
- Bring back our Interactive Storytelling Field
 Trips for OUSD classrooms (inviting up to
 400 elementary students into our space
 to collaboratively tell a story with a "live"
 illustrator.)
- Expand our Westlake Middle School
 Program to 4 days per week year-round to enhance students' joy, confidence, and academic outcomes.
- Conduct a comprehensive evaluation of our programs and the impact they have on Oakland youth with RISE Research
 & Evaluation
- Do the deep and important work to become and anti-racist organization with support from Be the Change Consulting
- Close our three-year, \$3,500,000 Make the Space Expansion and Growth Campaign!

NOISIV & NOISSIM

Chapter 510 is a made-in-Oakland youth writing, bookmaking & publishing center. Our teaching artists and volunteers work side-by-side with educators to provide a safe space and supportive community for Black, brown, and queer youth ages 8-19 to bravely write. Our vision is that every young person in Oakland writes with confidence and joy.

CHAPTER 510 PROGRAMMING

We believe that writing is an act of liberation. When young people write and get published, they transform themselves and their communities; succeeding in school, work, and life.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

We acknowledge that the land we are on today is the traditional and ancestral homelands of the Chochenyo Ohlone people. We are located in Huichin, also known as Oakland, on the unceded territories of Chochenyo and Ramaytush Ohlone peoples, who have continuously lived upon this land since time immemorial. We recognize the historic discrimination and violence inflicted upon Indigenous peoples in California and the Americas, including their forced removal from ancestral lands, and the deliberate and systematic destruction and genocide of their communities and culture.
